She is trained in protocol and etiquette. Her consulting practice includes training businesses, private clubs and community organizations as well as private coaching for adults and children.

SEAL TEAM SCUBA Grades 3rd-6th

Columbia SCUBA will provide an exciting program for young students who want to become underwater explorers. Campers, ages 8-12 years old, will learn SCUBA diving in a safe, controlled pool environment. The Seal Team program is built around a series of “Aqua Missions” that introduces young divers to basic SCUBA diving skills, buoyancy, underwater navigation, wreck diving, underwater photography, environmental awareness and more. The Seal Team is a PADI program, which is recognized as the world leader in diving education.

ROCKS & RIVERS Grades 3rd-6th
July 12-16 9:00 a. m. – 3:00 p. m. \$300

Under the care of PEAK Director Stan Wood, campers will learn climbing skills on Heathwood’s Alpine Tower and Odyssey ropes courses, and also put those skills to use on some small local adventures. Climbing is a great workout, which builds both strength and endurance. Preparation for this activity requires specific knowledge relative to safety gear, knots, and the belay process. Being off of the ground offers healthy risk-taking which builds self-confidence. Campers will also learn paddle strokes and rescue techniques on the Heathwood pond and then move to the gentle waters of the Congaree River for their first river expedition. As their skills and confidence improve, paddlers will move to Class I and Class II whitewater on the Saluda River. All the paddling gear and transportation to riverside classrooms will be provided.

<u>MIS AMIGOS</u>		<u>Grades 1st-4th</u>

Campers will explore important language arts, math, and social skills needed to be successful. Campers will learn to manipulate numbers with the number grid and games. Your child will also participate in word-study games, bookmaking, and author studies. Each child will have tons of fun and will leave the camp feeling confident about the upcoming school year.

<u>GRAPHIC ART & MULTIMEDIA</u>		<u>Grades 9th-12th</u>
July 19-23	1:00 p. m. – 4:00 p. m.	\$225

This credited course will cover the use of PhotoShop, painting, drawing, page layout, PowerPoint, and web page programs. Students will use scanners, digital cameras, and the internet to capture graphics, and then import them into their projects. Each section has projects that will determine the grade for the course. Heathwood Hall students may a 1/2- credit in technology by completing six different projects. Instructor: Bill Cherry

<u>VIDEO EDITING</u>		<u>Grades 9th-12th</u>
July 26-30	1:00 p. m. – 4:00 p. m.	\$225

In this credited course, students will be guided through the process of making and editing video projects while learning to use digital picture enhancement and 3-D animation. Emphasis will be placed on making a video look good as well as learning the technical aspects of the process. Enrollment will be limited to ten students on a first-come-first-serve basis. Heathwood Hall students may a 1/2- credit in technology by completing six different projects. Instructor: Bill Cherry

<u>ADVANCED PLACEMENT (AP) US GOVERNMENT</u>		<u>Grades 11th-12th</u>
On-Line Summer Course		\$450 + books

AP U. S. Government and Politics studies the operations and structure of the U. S. government and the behavior of the electorate and politicians. Students will gain the analytic perspective necessary to critically evaluate political data, hypotheses, concepts, opinions, and processes. Along the way, students will learn how to gather data about political behavior and develop their own theoretical analysis of American politics. Students will also build the skills they need to examine general propositions about government and politics, and to analyze the specific relationships between political, social, and economic institutions. AP U. S. Government and Politics prepares students for the AP Exam. The content aligns to the scope and sequence specified by the College Board and to widely used textbooks. Qualified students will earn a 1/2-credit. Instructor: Apex Learning

<u>ADVANCED PLACEMENT (AP) PSYCHOLOGY</u>		<u>Grades 11th-12th</u>
On-Line Summer Course		\$450 + books

AP Psychology provides an overview of current psychological research methods and theories. Students will explore the therapies used by professional counselors and clinical psychologists and examine reasons for normal human reactions: how people learn and think, the process of human development and human aggression, altruism, intimacy, and self-reflection. They'll study core psychological concepts, the brain and sense functions, learn to gauge human reactions, gather information, and form meaningful syntheses. Along the way, students will also investigate relevant

concepts like study skills and information retention. AP Psychology prepares students for the AP Exam. The content aligns to the scope and sequence specified by the College Board and to widely used textbooks. Qualified students will earn a 1/2-credit. Instructor: Apex Learning

WORLD RELIGIONS	Grades 10 th -12 th
On-Line Summer Course	\$450 + books

This course is designed to focus on the “commonality” between different religious traditions. Through an on-line discussion format, students will be challenged to explore all religious traditions and to become proficient in the “language” of religion. The course will follow a thematic approach to making these comparisons, focusing on issues such as faith, spirituality, liturgy, coexistence, afterlife, and pluralism. Students are assessed based on response to on-line prompts, quizzes, and a final exam/project. Internet access is required. Open to all rising students in grades 10 to 12. Heathwood students may earn a 1/2-religion or social science credit. Instructor: Bill Russell

PHILOSOPHY I	Grades 11 th -12 th
On-Line Summer Course	\$450 + books

This course explores traditional philosophical issues such as self-knowledge, ethical behavior, the nature and role of good and evil in the world, and the Epicurean dilemma from a conceptual and literary approach. Philosophy has traditionally been divided into five major branches: metaphysics, epistemology, logic, ethics, and aesthetics. In this course, we will explore all of these branches of thought with the exception of logic. Internet access is required. Heathwood students may earn a 1/2-credit for religion or social science.
